1. Information and scope of inspection

This section tells you about the type, accommodation, neighbourhood, age and construction of the property. It also tells you about the extent of the inspection and highlights anything that the surveyor could not inspect.

All references to visual inspection refer to an inspection from within the property without the need to move any obstructions and externally from ground level within the site and adjoining public areas. Any references to left or right are taken facing the front of the property.

The inspection is carried out without causing damage to the building or its contents and without endangering the occupiers or the surveyor. Heavy furniture, stored items and insulation are not moved. Unless identified in the report the surveyor will assume that no harmful or hazardous materials or techniques have been used in the construction. The presence or possible consequences of any site contamination will not be researched.


Services such as TV/cable connection, internet connection, swimming pools and other leisure facilities etc were not inspected or reported on.

Description	A mid terraced ground floor ex local authority owned flat. The flat is located in a 3 storey building.
Accommodation	Entrance hall, living room, kitchen, 2 bedrooms and a bathroom.
Gross internal floor area (m²)	63 sq m.
Neighbourhood and location	The property is set in an established social housing area close to the centre of Fort William. All essential services, amenities and transport links are nearby.
Age	Built 1957.
Weather	Overcast but dry. The preceding weather was mixed.
Chimney stacks	Visually inspected with the aid of binoculars where appropriate Communal masonry chimney stack with rendered surfaces, concrete cope and clay pots. There are lead flashings with the junction of the main roof.

	Roof spaces were visually inspected and were entered where there was safe and reasonable access, normally defined as being from a 3 m ladder within the property

The base course brickwork is exposed. It would not appear that cavity wall insulation has been inserted but we cannot say for certain.

	Kitchen fittings are new and comprise of a plastic vinyl faced range of proprietary base and wall units with a gloss finished door, proprietary worktop with matching upstand, integral sink and built in electric hob and oven housing.

fireplaces	No testing of the flues or fittings were carried out The chimney breast is lined in plasterboard. The fireplace opening to the living room houses a solid fuel stove with back boiler that provides central heating. There is a timber mantle above the stove. The hearth is in a slate.
	The stove was not lit at the time of inspection.
Internal decorations	Visually inspected Ceilings and walls have an emulsion paint finish generally on a plain plaster or plasterboard backing. Internal joinery is mainly painted. The doors have a light varnish finish or are natural.

Electricity	Accessible parts of the wiring were visually inspected without removing fittings. No tests whatsoever were carried out to the system or appliances. Visual inspection does not assess any services to make sure they work properly and efficiently and meet modern standards. If any services are turned off, the surveyor will state that in the report and will not turn them on Mains electricity supply. The meter and fuse board are located at high level within the entrance hall. Electrical fittings are generally of a more modern pattern.

fittings	No tests whatsoever were carried out to the system or appliances Mains water supply. Plumbing supplies where viewed are in copper, wastes are in plastic and cast iron.
	Bathroom fittings are reasonably modern and comprise of a ceramic wc, ceramic wash hand basin and a steel bath. There is an electric shower over the bath. Surfaces around the bath are in a proprietary wet wall.

	No tests whatsoever were carried out to the system or appliances Central heating is provided by the solid fuel stove with back boiler which heats steel radiators throughout the property. As advised previously the fire was not lit at the time of inspection. The heating/radiators are controlled by TRV's.
	Hot water is heated and stored in a copper cylinder located within a cupboard to the kitchen. The water is heated by the back boiler or alternative electric immersers.
Drainage	Drainage covers etc were not lifted Neither drains nor drainage systems were tested Drainage connects to the mains system.

alarms	No tests whatsoever were carried out to the system or appliances There are no fire or burglar alarms. There are smoke detectors in places.
	Fire Safety Legislation effective from February 2022 requires a smoke alarm to be installed in the room most frequently used for living purposes and in every circulation space on each floor. A heat detection alarm must be installed in every kitchen area and all smoke and heat alarms must be ceiling mounted and interlinked. Where there is a carbon fuelled appliance e.g. central heating boiler, open fire, wood burning stove, etc, a carbon monoxide detector is also required. - 1. The common elements of the property together with the liabilities for the maintenance and upkeep of the same should be confirmed.

PART 1 - GENERAL

1.1 THE SURVEYORS

The Seller has engaged the Surveyors to provide the Single Survey Report. The Seller has also engaged the Surveyors to provide an Energy Report in the format prescribed by the accredited Energy Company.

Once the Seller has conditionally accepted an offer to purchase made in writing, the Purchaser's lender or conveyancer may request that the Surveyors provide general comment on standard appropriate supplementary documentation. In the event of a significant amount of documentation being provided to the Surveyors, an additional fee may be incurred by the Purchaser. Any additional fee will be agreed in writing.

If information is provided to the Surveyors during the conveyancing process which materially affects the valuation stated in the Report, the Surveyors reserve the right to reconsider the valuation. Where the Surveyors require to amend the valuation in consequence of such information, they will issue an amended Report to the Seller. - any person(s) who make(s) (or on whose behalf is made) an offer to purchase the Property, whether or not that offer is accepted by the Seller;
- the Purchaser; and
- the professional advisers of any of these.

The Surveyors acknowledge that their duty of skill and care in relation to the Report is owed to the Seller and to the Purchaser. The Surveyors accept no responsibility or liability whatsoever in relation to the Report to persons other than the Seller and the Purchaser. The Seller and Purchaser should be aware that if a Lender seeks to rely on this Report they do so at their own risk. In particular, the Surveyors accept no responsibility or liability whatsoever to any Lender in relation to the Report. Any such Lender relies upon the Report entirely at their own risk.

1.4 INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY





The energy efficiency rating of your home



1 Cavity wall insulation

Cavity wall insulation, to fill the gap between the inner and outer layers of external walls with an insulating material, reduces heat loss; this will improve levels of comfort, reduce energy use and lower fuel bills. The insulation material is pumped into the gap through small holes that are drilled into the outer walls, and the holes are made good afterwards. As specialist machinery is used to fill the cavity, a professional installation company should carry out this work, and they should carry out a thorough survey before commencing work to ensure that this type of insulation is suitable for this home and its exposure. They should also provide a guarantee for the work and handle any building standards issues. 2 Internal or external wall insulation

Internal or external wall insulation involves adding a layer of insulation to either the inside or the outside surface of the external walls, which reduces heat loss and lowers fuel bills. As it is more expensive than cavity wall insulation it is only recommended for walls without a cavity, or where for technical reasons a cavity cannot be filled. Internal insulation, known as dry-lining, is where a layer of insulation is fixed to the inside surface of external walls; this type of insulation is best applied when rooms require redecorating. External solid wall insulation is the application of an insulant and a weather-protective finish to the outside of the wall. This may improve the look of the home, particularly where existing brickwork or rendering is poor, and will provide long-lasting weather protection. Further information can be obtained from the National Insulation Association (www.nationalinsulationassociation.org.uk). It should be noted that a building warrant is required for the installation of external wall insulation. Planning permission may also be required and that building regulations apply to external insulation so it is best to check with your local authority on both issues.

3 Floor insulation (suspended floor)

Insulation of a floor will significantly reduce heat loss; this will improve levels of comfort, reduce energy use and lower fuel bills. Suspended floors can often be insulated from below but must have adequate ventilation to prevent dampness; seek advice about this if unsure. Further information about floor insulation is available from many sources including www.energysavingtrust.org.uk/scotland/Insulation/Floor-insulation. Building regulations generally apply to this work so it is best to check with your local authority building standards department.

Low and zero carbon energy sources

Low and zero carbon (LZC) energy sources are sources of energy that release either very little or no carbon dioxide into the atmosphere when they are used. Installing these sources may help reduce energy bills as well as cutting carbon.
